'Heavy Pedal' gives the impression that our ears need to take cover but that's rarely the case on this disc. The eight works – performed to vibrant effect by five organists and colleagues – go well beyond clamorous sonorities, exploring myriad moods and registrations.

For celebratory brightness, there's Tadd Russo's *Salzburg Prelude*, which is followed by the contrasting darkness of his *In Paradisum*, based on a poem by Edgar Allan Poe. Even more menacing is Curt Cacioppo's 'di cibo celeste', an expansive narrative that treats a theme sung by Mozart's Commendatore to imposing transformations and a panoply of instrumental colors.

The organ welcomes partners in Ron Nagorcka's *Fantasia*, a jazzy and lyrical teaming with clarinet, and *To be a Pilgrim*, which unites trombone, organ and didjeridu, the ancient Australian wind instrument that drones with sepulchral resonance. Michael

Summers's urgently dramatic *Variations on an English Folksong* goes against the pastoral grain of the genre by taking up a grim tune, 'Hanged I shall be', about a man who kills his pregnant lover.

The disc's only departed composer is Wilhelm Middelschulte, a German-born organist who performed with the Chicago Symphony in the early 20th century. The *Perpetuum mobile* from his Organ Concerto on a Theme by Johann Sebastian Bach is a thing of sonorous beauty for pedals alone. In his *Passacaglia*, Middelschulte honours Bach within 62 variations and a toccata on a chromatic theme.

The recording of each work captures the grandeur and chameleon-like character of organs in the United States, Norway and the Czech Republic.

Donald Rosenberg
